- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Internet Tax Non-
- 5 discrimination Act".
- 6 SEC. 2. PERMANENT EXTENSION OF INTERNET TAX FREE-
- 7 DOM ACT MORATORIUM.
- 8 (a) Permanent Extension; Internet Access
- 9 Taxes.—Section 1101 of the Internet Tax Freedom Act
- 10 (47 U.S.C. 151 note) is amended—

1	(1) by striking "taxes during the period begin-
2	ning on October 1, 1998, and ending 3 years after
3	the date of the enactment of this Act—" and insert-
4	ing "taxes after September 30, 1998:";
5	(2) by striking paragraph (1) of subsection (a)
6	and inserting the following:
7	"(1) Taxes on Internet access.",
8	(3) by striking "multiple" in paragraph (2) of
9	subsection (a) and inserting "Multiple";
10	(4) by striking subsection (d); and
11	(5) by redesignating subsections (e) and (f) as
12	subsections (d) and (e), respectively.
13	(b) Conforming Amendment.—Section 1104(10)
14	of the Internet Tax Freedom Act (47 U.S.C. 151 note)
15	is amended by striking "unless" and all that follows
16	through "1998".
