A BILL

- To authorize the extension of nondiscriminatory treatment (normal trade relations treatment) to the products of Ukraine.
 - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
 - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. FINDINGS.

- 4 Congress finds as follows:
- 5 (1) Ukraine allows its citizens the right and op-6 portunity to emigrate, free of any heavy tax on emi-7 gration or on the visas or other documents required 8 for emigration and free of any tax, levy, fine, fee, or 9 other charge on any citizens as a consequence of the

desire of such citizens to emigrate to the country of
 their choice.

3 (2) Ukraine has received normal trade relations
4 treatment since 1992 and has been found to be in
5 full compliance with the freedom of emigration re6 quirements under title IV of the Trade Act of 1974
7 since 1994.

8 (3) since the establishment of an independent 9 Ukraine in 1991, Ukraine has made substantial 10 progress toward the creation of democratic institu-11 tions and a free-market economy.

12 (4) Ukraine has committed itself to ensuring 13 freedom of religion, respect for rights of minorities, 14 and eliminating intolerance and has been a paragon 15 of inter-ethnic cooperation and harmony, as evi-16 denced by the annual human rights reports of the 17 Organization for Security and Cooperation in Eu-18 rope (OSCE) and the United States Department of 19 State.

(5) Ukraine has taken major steps toward global security by ratifying the Treaty on the Reduction
and Limitation of Strategic Offensive Weapons
(START I) and the Treaty on the Non-Proliferation
of Nuclear Weapons, subsequently turning over the
last of its Soviet-era nuclear warheads on June 1,

1 1996, and agreeing, in 1998, not to assist Iran with 2 the completion of a program to develop and build 3 nuclear breeding reactors, and has fully supported 4 the United States in nullifying the Anti-Ballistic 5 Missile (ABM) Treaty. 6 (6) At the Madrid Summit in 1997, Ukraine 7 became a member of the North Atlantic Cooperation 8 Council of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization 9 (NATO), and has been a participant in the Partner-10 ship for Peace (PfP) program since 1994. 11 (7) Ukraine is peaceful state which established 12 exemplary relations with all neighboring countries, 13 and consistently pursues a course of European inte-14 gration with a commitment to ensuring democracy and prosperity for its citizens. 15 16 (8) Ukraine has built a broad and durable rela-17 tionship with the United States and has been an un-18 wavering ally in the struggle against international 19 terrorism that has taken place since the attacks 20 against the United States that occurred on Sep-21 tember 11, 2001. 22 (9) Ukraine has concluded a bilateral trade 23 agreement with the United States that entered into

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SEC. 2. TERMINATION OF APPLICATION OF TITLE IV OF THE TRADE ACT OF 1974 TO THE PRODUCTS OF UKRAINE.

4 (a) PRESIDENTIAL DETERMINATIONS AND EXTEN5 SION OF NONDISCRIMINATORY TREATMENT.—Notwith6 standing any provision of title IV of the Trade Act of 1974
7 (19 U.S.C. 2431 et seq.), the President may—

8 (1) determine that such title should no longer9 apply to Ukraine; and

10 (2) after making a determination under para-11 graph (1) with respect to Ukraine, proclaim the ex-12 tension of nondiscriminatory treatment (normal 13 trade relations treatment) to the products of that 14 country.

(b) TERMINATION OF APPLICABILITY OF TITLE
16 IV.—On and after the effective date under subsection (a)
17 of the extension of nondiscriminatory treatment to the
18 products of Ukraine, title IV of the Trade Act of 1974
19 shall cease to apply to that country.

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
