- 6 (A) has made considerable progress toward
 7 respecting fundamental human rights consistent
 8 with the objectives of title IV of the Trade Act
 9 of 1974;

1	(B) has adopted administrative procedures
2	that accord its citizens the right to emigrate,
3	travel freely, and to return to their country
4	without restriction;
5	(C) has been found to be in full compliance
6	with the freedom of emigration provisions in
7	title IV of the Trade Act of 1974;
8	(D) has made great progress toward the
9	establishment of a genuine democracy and the
10	creation of a free market economic system;
11	(E) has demonstrated a commitment to
12	adopting the full range of internationally recog-
13	nized core labor standards and to continuing to
14	improve the effective enforcement of its laws re-
15	flecting such standards;
16	(F) has committed to developing a system
17	of governance in accordance with the provisions
18	of the Final Act of the Conference on Security
19	and Cooperation in Europe (also known as the
20	"Helsinki Final Act") regarding human rights
21	and humanitarian affairs;
22	(G) has endeavored to address issues re-
23	lated to its national and religious minorities
24	and, as a member state of the Organization for
25	Security and Cooperation in Europe (OSCE),

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committed to adopting special measures for ensuring that persons belonging to national minorities have full equality individually as well as in community with other members of their group;

6 (H) has enacted legislation to provide pro-7 tection against incitement to violence against 8 persons or groups based on national, racial, eth-9 nic, or religious discrimination, including anti-10 Semitism, and has committed itself, including 11 through a December 17, 2001, letter from the 12 President of Ukraine to the President of the 13 United States, to ensuring freedom of religion 14 and combating racial and ethnic intolerance and 15 hatred;

16 (I) has continued to return communal 17 properties confiscated from national and reli-18 gious minorities during the Soviet period, facili-19 tating the reemergence of these communities in 20 the national life of Ukraine, and establishing 21 the legal framework for completion of this proc-22 ess in the future;

23 (J) has concluded a bilateral trade agree24 ment with the United States in 1992 and a bi25 lateral investment treaty in 1994;

2	build a friendly and cooperative relationship
