 - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
 - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be cited as the "Butterfield Overland

5 Trail Study Act".

3 (a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary of the Interior (hereafter in this Act referred to as the "Secretary"), in 4 5 consultation with appropriate Federal, State, county and local governmental entities, shall conduct a resource study 6 7 along the "Ox-Bow Route" of the Butterfield Overland 8 Trail in the States of Missouri, Tennessee, Arkansas, 9 Oklahoma, Texas, New Mexico, Arizona, and California (hereafter in this Act referred to as the "trail area"). The 10 11 study shall evaluate a range of alternatives for protecting 12 and interpreting the resources of the trail area, including 13 alternatives for potential addition of the trail area to the National Trails System. 14

(b) STUDY OBJECTIVES.—In conducting the study
under subsection (a), the Secretary shall evaluate alternatives for achieving the following objectives:

18 (1) Identifying the resources and historic19 themes associated with the trail area.

20 (2) Making a review of existing studies and re21 ports to complement, and not duplicate, other stud22 ies of the scenic or historical importance of the
23 Butterfield Overland Trail and associated resources
24 that may be underway or undertaken.

25 (3) Establishing connections with partnerships

and sites along the corridor of the Butterfield Over land Trail.

3 (4) Preserving recreational opportunities and
4 facilitating access for a variety of recreational users.

5 (5) Protecting historically significant land6 scapes, districts, sites, and structures of the trail
7 area.

8 (6) Identifying alternatives for preservation and
9 interpretation of the trail area by the National Park
10 Service, other Federal, State, or local governmental
11 entities, or private and non-profit organizations.

12 (7) Identifying cost estimates for any necessary
13 acquisition, development, interpretation, operation,
14 and maintenance associated with the alternatives re15 ferred to in subsection (a).

(c) TRANSMISSION TO CONGRESS.—Not later than 3
years after funds are first made available for the study,
the Secretary shall transmit the final study to the Committee on Energy and Natural Resources of the United
States Senate and to the Committee on Natural Resources
of the United States House of Representatives.

22 SEC. 3. PRIVATE PROPERTY PROTECTIONS.

23 (a) ALTERNATIVES TO PROTECT PRIVATE PROP-24 ERTY.—In conducting the resource study under section

2(a), the Secretary shall not consider any alternative that
 would—

3 (1) require any private property owner to allow
4 public access (including Federal, State, or local gov5 ernment access) to such private property;

6 (2) modify any provision of Federal, State, or
7 local law with regard to public access to or use of
8 private property;

9 (3) create any liability, or have any effect on
10 any liability under any other law, of any private
11 property owner with respect to any persons injured
12 on such private property;

(4) modify the authority of Federal, State, orlocal governments to regulate land use; or

(5) require the owner of any private property to
participate in or be associated with any addition to
the National Parks System.

(b) IMPACTS ON PRIVATE PROPERTY.—The study
shall include an analysis and documentation regarding
whether each alternative proposed has potential or actual
impact on private property located within or abutting the
trail area.

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
